Prof Mark Joseph's work on mixed communities in the USA that raises strong doubts that mixed income and mixed tenure engineering have any materiel impact (very strongly evidence based research, academic award winning in the USA)

LC&G interim evaluation (2009) of the Pathfinder (housing market recovery) programmes in England. Is Mixed-Income Development an Antidote to Urban Poverty? Abstract from Professor Mark L Joseph's USA award winning research on mixed communities. He critically assesses the potential for mixed-income development as a means of helping lift families in U.S. inner cities out of poverty. He identifies four main propositions for the promise of mixed-income development, provides a conceptual framework that delineates the pathways through which mixed-income development can be hypothesized to improve the quality of life for the urban poor, and reviews the evidence from existing research on the relevance of these propositions. (The original is maybe weighty material for some readers but recommended as a strong evidence-based benchmark.
