CONNECTING COMMUNITIES TO ECONOMIC OPPORTUNITIES

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Communities Scotland

THE ISSUE

- 1. In local economies, from time to time there are major developments (e.g. big construction projects, new supermarket openings, major expansions of existing employers)
- 2. These can create significant employment opportunities where getting in at the start is crucial.
- 3. Typically, more disadvantaged groups (e.g. long term unemployed) and members of poorer communities benefit little even if located close to development.
- 4. We need to do better by developing more effective processes and this was focus of research.

POLICY CONTEXT

- 1. Connecting communities and economic opportunities fits with Closing the Opportunity Gap strategy of previous administration, so clearly this may now be revised or replaced.
- 2. Aberdeen City and Aberdeenshire collaborated on Workforce Plus Action Plan to fit with Scottish Executive's Employability Framework and Workplace Plus is likely to be endorsed by the new administration.
- 3. There is also potential contribution to NEET strategy also likely to be endorsed by new administration, but rebranded.
- 4. Fits Scottish Enterprise's Linking Opportunity and Need (LOAN) framework.


RESEARCH EVIDENCE ON THE PROBLEM

- 1. Worklessness in proportionate terms low in Aberdeen City and Shire but nonetheless over 26,000 people and little decline over past year
- 2. Gap between poorest communities on average has not been closing and may now be widening. Number of worst 15% of Scotland's data zones in City and Shire grew from 20 to 33 on latest SIMD
- 3. Some of poorest communities now on par with Glasgow's worst although problem less widespread
- 4. Strategic awareness of the need to become more effective in linking opportunity and need but no clear operational responsibility for making this happen
- 5. Full spectrum of services required to move people from joblessness to sustainable employment appears to be in place with possible issues around specialist services such as money advice.

THE PROBLEM (CONT'D)

- 6. Concern about coordination between 'community' and 'employability' services see diagram. Not an effective pipeline or pathway for jobless people.
- 7. Concern about effectiveness of engagement process with employers despite employers reporting willingness to engage
- 8. Management information systems lacking for assessing effectiveness of engagement, progression and sustainability of employability services for residents of most disadvantaged communities

RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1. The Local Economic Forum (ACSEF) should take responsibility for driving forward on LOAN agenda
- 2. The strategic emphasis on LOAN needs to be sharpened. ACSEF should review and revise strategic position, merging objectives 2 and 6
- 3. Need to bring other organisations into process particularly Jobcentre Plus

RECOMMENDATIONS (CONTD)

- 4. A LOAN Action Plan needs to be generated
 - Objectives and targets
 - Plugging service gaps
 - Improve flow from 'community' to 'employability' services
 - Develop more effective employer engagement processes, building on new Local Employment Partnerships and Public Sector Academies
 - Public sector demonstration of commitment jobs
 - Performance measurement and management system
- 5. A number of building blocks need to be put in place to create operational mechanisms for maximising LOAN benefits
 - Dedicated project management a must do
 - Build small team around project manager a should do
- 6. Move towards more co-ordinated approach to procurement of employability services

RECOMMENDATIONS (CONTD)

7. Deliver all of this as essentially a Workforce Plus pilot, or certainly well integrated into Workforce Plus Action Plan.
